Two years ago, my brother and sister-in-law gave us an herb AeroGarden for Christmas. After the holiday craziness, we put the apparatus together, filled the basin with water, and plugged it in. It came with pods which had a special spongy cone in them and some seeds that had already been sown into it. We set the preseeded pods into the hydroponic

system, poured a capful of plant food into the water, and went on with life. With only water and plant food, these herbs started

to grow. After a few weeks, we could see green sprouts coming up. I was amazed at how big some of the herbs got: the mint spread across multiple sections. The parsley and Thai basil grew so that I often had to cut them lest the leaves burn on the special lights. Once it got started well, the dill quickly shot up. For months, we had more mint, Thai basil,



parsley, and dill than we knew what to do with. When I got tired of the mint, I attempted to replant

it, but the roots were so big that I had to significantly cut them with scissors to be able to even remove the plant from the AeroGarden. And they weren't easy to cut.

As I thought about our stewardship campaign coming up later this month, I was reminded of this AeroGarden. Our theme for this year is based on Jeremiah


17:7-8, which compares those who trust in the Lord to trees planted by water. My little herbs weren't trees, but their leaves would stay green a long time. They produced

much "fruit" in terms of flavorful leaves which could be harvested for dill sauce and mint tea and pesto. Their roots became big and sturdy.

So our faith affects us. A deep connection with God can strengthen and sustain us, enabling us to live generously even in challenging times. Being connected to Christ leads to a fruitful life and one of generosity. As I say every Sunday, God loves you more than you can imagine. So let us grow in Christ over this season, deepening our spiritual roots and continuing to share the love of Christ as we share our blessings beyond our church walls.

### No Lone Ranger Christians

World Communion Sunday, celebrated this year on **October 6**, reminds us there's no such thing as solitary Christianity. "As Christians we're called to belong, not just to believe," writes Rick Warren. "We are not meant to live loneranger lives; instead, we are to belong to Christ's family and be members of his body."

After all, Christian fellowship can't occur without fellow Christians. We can't learn the intricacies of the Bible and theology without preachers and teachers. We

don't baptize ourselves. We don't take Holy Communion alone; in fact, the sacrament's very name refers to interaction with God and others.

The New Testament clearly states that one cannot be Christian all alone. We are members of Christ's body (Ephesians 5:30). We belong to the family of believers (Galatians 6:10). We are "a

royal priesthood, a holy nation, God's own people" (I Peter 2:9, NRSV). So don't be a lone ranger or a stranger — to worship or to Holy Communion!

### An Ancient Stewardship Message

Some Christians actively avoid church on Stewardship Sunday because giving is a private matter "between me and God." New pastors are even sometimes advised never to preach about money, lest certain people get riled up. Yet Jesus talks frequently in the Gospels about giving and sharing our material goods — and he wasn't the first in Scripture to do so.

A thousand years before Christ's birth, King David prepared to hand over the kingdom to his son, gathering tons (literally!) of gold, silver and other materials for Solomon to use in building the temple. Revealing his take on stewardship, David prayed: "But who am I, and who are my people, that we should be able to give as generously as this? Everything comes from you, and we have given you only what comes from your hand" (I Chronicles 29:14, NIV).
